All Catholic Elementary Schools in the Archdiocese of New York to Close Due to Forecasted Snowstorm

There will be No Remote Learning

(February 12, 2024 – New York, NY) – All Catholic Elementary Schools in the Archdiocese of New York, will be closed tomorrow, Tuesday, February 13, due to the forecasted snowstorm.

The day will be a “traditional snow day” with no remote instruction. This includes Catholic schools in New York City and the upper suburban counties.

All Catholic schools have snow days built into their calendars with contingencies for making up instruction time.

Archdiocesan High Schools operate independently, so high school families need to follow instructions from their individual schools.
